NATIVE PLANTS

Maine certainly has some beautiful native plants and many can be incorporated in your landscape. I asked Garden Club Presidents if their clubs have any gardens or activities around native plants and received a wonderful array of emails!

Bar Harbor Garden Club President, Floy Ervin reported that their club is very interested in Maine native plants. A member of St. Croix District, their club gives donations and members donate their time in the maintenance and management of the Wild Gardens of Acadia at Sieur de Monts in Acadia National Park.

Bath Garden Club President Barbara Richards told me she planted a Native Maine Plant teaching garden at the Woolwich History Museum, just East of Bath a few years ago. She is the only caretaker during the summer but says the plants are doing well! They were awarded Maine and New England Region Awards for their project within the past few years.

Kathleen Marty, President of Boothbay Region Garden Club had a lot to report. First, the Medomak District Meeting held last May featured a "Green Side Up" theme. Maureen Heffernan, Executive Director of Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens was their featured speaker. Maureen talked about growing native plants based on her research and work for her recent book, *Native Plants for Your Maine Garden*. Club member, Pat McMichael, spoke on the nature preserve known as Penny Lake in the heart of Boothbay. It is a haven for wildlife and native plants. Coastal Maine Botanical Garden Director, Barbara Freeman presented a slide show on "Gardening for all the Senses." CMBG uses a variety of native plants throughout the gardens. Dennis Anderson, an arborist, landscaper and horticulturist presented a program for the club on Tree and Shrubs – best choices and care for Maine gardens.

Karen Johnson from Bucksport Garden Club reported that in April of 2009 they planted at Buck Memorial Library several native plants; *Clethra alnifolia* (Ruby Spice Summersweet), *Ilex verticillatas* (Red Sprite Winterberry and Jim Dandy Winterberry), *Aster novae-angliae* and *Aster novi-belgii* (Purple Dome and Alert), *Liatris spicata* (Blazing Star), *Dahlia Peter's Purple*, and *Geum triflorum* (Prairie Smoke). This year they added to the rock garden with *Phlox divaricata laphamii* (Wild Blue Phlox), *Tiarella cordifolia* (Foam Flower) and *Arctostaphylos uva-ursi* (Bearberry).

Lynn Jourdan from Seacoast Garden Club in Kennebunkport (Piscataqua District) reported that they planted a native plant buffer along the Kennebunk River at the historical Grit Mill property owned by the Kennebunkport Conservation Trust.

Sherry McConnell, President of Old York Garden Club in Piscataqua District sent me

a report from Jane Grace, project leader for a work in progress. In 2008, Old York Garden Club and the Old York Historical Society teamed together to create a native garden (native to the 1740s) at one of the town's historic homes, resulting in the Native Courtyards at the Emerson-Wilcox House. Successes include the planting of *Cornus alternifolia* (Pagoda Dogwood), *Chelone* (Turtlehead), *Clematis terniflora* (Sweet Autumn Clematis) and *Eupatorium* (Joe Pye Weed). Less successful have been *Juniperis* (Common Juniper), *Tiarella cordifolia* (Foam Flower) and *Vaccinium angustifolium* (Low-bush blueberry). Late this Fall they planted native roses and I hope they will report in the Spring how they handled the winter months.

In Penobscot County, Brewer Garden & Bird Club, Sebasticook Garden Club and Hampden Garden Club held programs on native plants. Carleen Harriman from Sebasticook said they had Kate Garland from the UMaine Cooperative Extension, who brought samples of native and non-native plants and had groups guess what they were and where they grew. Carleen reported this was a real learning experience. Anne Bennette from Hampden G.C. said they had Julie Beckford from Rebel Hill Farm present a program on native plants. Brewer Garden & Bird Club had a similar programs with both speakers.

The Garden Club of Wiscasset in Madomak District has a wonderful project at the Wiscasset Public Library. They are using plants native to their area in a semi-circular bed in front of a picture window of the children's room of the library. In the spring and summer, *Echinacea purpurea*, (Coneflower) *Monarda didyma*, (Bergamot), Goldenrod, *Iris cristata* (Crested Iris), *Lobelia siphilitica* (Blue Cardinal Flower) and *Aculegia Canadensis* (Wild Columbine) brought in many hummingbirds and butterflies. Along the fence line they planted *Eupatorium purpurem* (Joe Pye Wee), *Echinacea*, wild geranium and *Chelone glabra* (White Turtlehead). In the shade they have ferns, *Actaea racemosa* (Cimicifuga or Bugbane), *Cornus Canadensis* (Bunchberry), Solomon's Seal and Lady Slippers. This fall they ordered Red Trillium, Turk's Cap Lily and White Baneberry. The group was also considering planting *Arisaema triphyllum* (Jack-in-the-Pulpit).

Bar Harbor Garden Club has been invited to join Mount Desert Garden Club in a Garden Club of America sponsored project, "Partners for Plants", a project led by botanists in monitoring the endangered species and eradicating non-native invasive species in Acadia National Park.

All of these projects and programs add to our knowledge about the importance of native plants. Please keep reporting about your club's accomplishments.



NEW BLUE STAR MEMORIAL MARKER DEDICATED BY THE BOOTHBAY REGION GARDEN CLUB

It was a cold blustery day in Boothbay Harbor on Sunday afternoon, 7 November, 2010 when the Boothbay Region Garden Club dedicated a new Blue Star Memorial Marker in the Pocket Garden by the Boothbay Region High School.

A brisk and rousing march by the Boothbay Region Community Alumni Band started the dedication ceremony as the flags of the Color Guard from the Coast Guard Station Boothbay Harbor were whipping in the wind. Community members wrapped in layers of fleece and wool stood at attention while the Cub Scout Troop 238 from Southport lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance and Pam Mancuso, a resident of the community, invited us to join in the singing of the *Star Spangled Banner*.



The Reverend Doctor Mary Jo Zimmerli, a club member, set the mood of the dedication with a moving invocation. Our club President Kathleen Marty welcomed the shivering guests noting that we had three Past GCFM Presidents (Wendy Cote, Allison Beards, and Shirlene Gosline), our Medomak District Director, Kathleen Filtrante, many Garden Club members, Legionnaires, and community members present. She went on in her introduction to read letters of congratulations from our Senators Snow and Collins and the Nation Garden Club President, Renee Blaschke.

Linda Redman, GCFM Blue Star Chair shared with the audience a brief history of the Blue Star Memorial Program and also the fact that just before the Dedication began that she had received a phone call reporting that her son who was returning from Afghanistan would be landing in the USA within hours. That certainly warmed

the hearts of all of us. A most interesting part of the history of the Blue Star Program for us was that sitting wrapped snugly in hat, coat, and gloves was a daughter of the original group of ladies who had initiated the Blue Star Memorial Program in NJ in 1944, Sue Bogart, a long standing member of the BRGC.

After brief Military Tributes from Jim Singer, Commander of the American Legion Post 36, BM Ken McSherry, USCG Station Boothbay Harbor, and Chick Ciciotte, American Legion Blue Star Chair of Maine, the band warmed up the audience with the familiar *My Country, 'Tis of Thee*.

As chilly as the afternoon was, we were reminded in the Dedication Tribute by Linda Redman of the importance in remembering the sacrifices our military members have made and continue to make in standing in our place to protect and ensure our many freedoms.

The Blue Star Memorial Marker was officially accepted by representatives from each of the communities in the immediate area with words of honor, praise, and thanks. Linc Sample, Selectman of Boothbay Harbor, Smith Climo, Selectman of Southport, and Charles Cunningham, Selectman of Boothbay were most gracious in their acceptance of the Marker for our entire community.

As a wreath was placed on the new Marker and the Marker was unveiled, a stirring rendition of *Good Bless America* was played by the band. After the benediction by World War II Veteran, Rev Doctor Robert Zimmerli, the Dedication was concluded with a moving tribute of Taps by Andreas Panagore, a student at BRHS.

Everyone was invited to pass by the new Blue Star Memorial Marker and then join us for a reception in the BRHS Cafeteria. It was the thought of some warm coffee, tea or hot chocolate that brought most of the audience to the reception to warm their cold feet, hands and bodies. Our hearts needed no extra warmth as our love of country filled most of our hearts.

Our morning program beginning at 10:00am will feature a talk by Jay Adams, Executive Director of the Arboretum. Jay, the other staff members and the Arboretum's board and volunteers have been working hard to shift the focus of what the Arboretum does back to collections and education. His presentation will cover the fascinating history of the land and the organization, a journey which in his words will lead us toward a sustainable future for the Viles Arboretum.

There will be a brown bag lunch and ample time for all to take in some of the new exhibits in the ever changing Visitors Center and to meet the Arboretum staff. Beginning at 1:00pm. 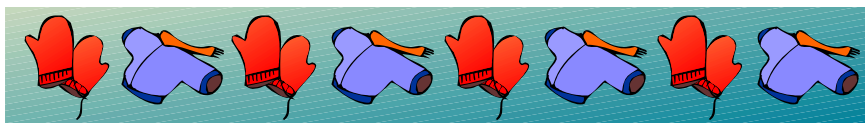

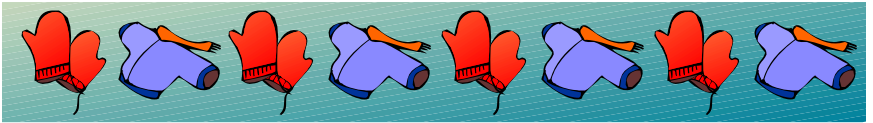

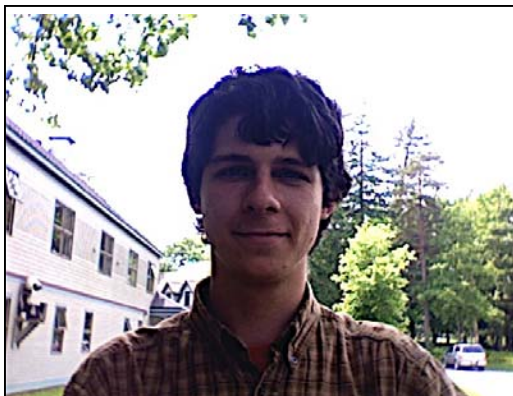
SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS UPDATE

AN UPDATE FROM LUKA NEGOITA, OUR 2010-2011 GCFM HORTICULTURE SCHOLARSHIP and NGC SCHOLARSHIP WINNER

One of the many benefits of scholarships offered by the GCFM and the NGC is that they enable bright and highly motivated students to focus on their area of interest without having to invest so much time and anxiety in finding other ways to finance their education. When Luka Negoita applied for his scholarship he was preparing to do a survey of plants on Little Duck Island, a botanically unexplored 80-acre island 8 miles south of Mount Desert Island. Given the fact that this is one of the few medium-sized islands on the mid-coast of Maine that apparently does not have a history of human habitation--and that it is important as the nesting grounds for a large colony of seabirds--the scholarship committee realized that Luka's study had the potential to provide important information for conservation and management efforts on this and other islands in the area. Here is his most recent update on his progress with that project:

Dear Mary,

I have said to many that this summer is worth a book--both in terms of how much happened, as well as the quality of the experience. I was very lucky to have the opportunity to spend most of it living on Little Duck or Great

Duck Island. I helped out with seabird research while on Great Duck in exchange for my stay. On Little Duck, fellow student Matthew Dickinson helped me conduct a survey of vegetation on the island. We collected over 200 plant specimens—concluding in a tentative list of approximately 150 species belonging to at least 42 families. We also measured the percent cover of every species of vascular plant in 67 2m x 10m plots across the island. We collected soil samples from each plot that later were tested for mineral content. On top of that we took many notes on general natural history observations such as the birds of the island. It was a very productive summer. Thankfully the costs for equipment and food were covered by grants from the Garden Club of America and Maine Space Grant Consortium.

I've been back at school since the beginning of September. It has been going really well, but of course very busy. I'm taking a class in Geographic Information Systems (GIS) where I've been applying the data from this summer to generate interesting maps of Little Duck Island in hopes of better understanding its ecology. I am currently working on a summary poster about all the data collected on LDI. I should be done with it by the end of next Friday and will send it alone to you in case GCFM members are interested. I still have a lot to do with the data though. I anticipate this project going into next summer, but don't know yet. Senior year has been good so far and I look forward to the rest of it.

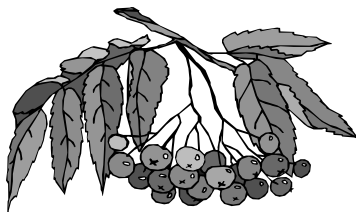

October 17, 2010

The bank subsequently reimbursed the District over and above actual costs, giving us a nice reserve account for future flower shows. We are planning to participate once again in the rejuvenated, but scaled down Bangor's Garden Show, April 8-10, 2011. An Art in Bloom show is planned.

Despite the excellent programs and gracious hosting of our district spring and fall meetings, attendance has been steadily declining at these events, whereas the individual clubs continue to retain their members' participation in their local community activities. Thus the District is in the process of evaluating our "Policies" to consider making changes to adapt to the current trends. We are considering changing our term limits restriction for elected officers of the District, to allow volunteer leadership to remain in office for more than one two-year term. And we are considering eliminating our Fall District Meeting, to have only one District-wide meeting per year at our Spring Annual Meeting. We have already changed our fiscal year to conform to the GCFM's fiscal year, which is June 1 to May 31.

Educational programs at our last three District meetings featured naturalist Tony Sohns's fascinating presentation about Maine wildlife (he may be located on his website); and programs from our homegrown plant experts in our district: Sonia Cianchette's updated species recommendations "Sonia's Beauties," with a truckload of plants to show and sell; and Lisa Colburn sharing the results of her extensive survey of Maine gardeners regarding the top recommendations of "Wow Plants for Maine Gardens."

Our District newsletter has been disseminated twice a year for four years now, thanks to our newsletter editor Carol Smith's excellent work on this. The District awarded her our District Award of Honor this year for all her generous contributions to the district over the last several years, including district director, flower show chairman, and newsletter editor.

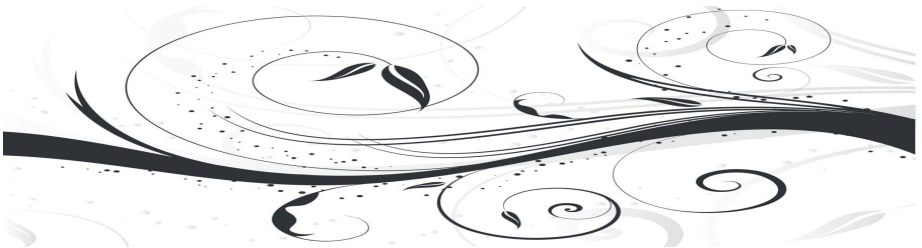

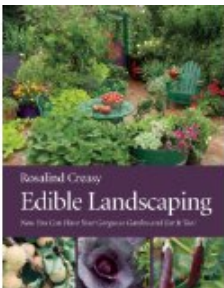

She is a two-time, 23 year breast cancer survivor whose passion for helping other women has led her to multiple volunteer activities with the American Cancer Society.
